DEFINITION OF TERMS

PIRACY

- (A) Any illegal acts of Violence or Detention, or any act of Depredation, committed for private ends by the crew or the passengers of a private ship or a private aircraft, and directed: (i) on the High Seas, against another Ship or Aircraft, or against persons or property on board such ship or aircraft. (ii) against a ship, aircraft, persons or property in a place outside the jurisdiction of any State.
- (B) Any act of voluntary participation in the operation of a ship or of an aircraft with knowledge of facts making it a pirate ship or aircraft.
- (C) Any act of inciting or of intentionally facilitating an act described in subparagraph (a) or (b).

• ARMED ROBBERY AT SEA

Any unlawful act of Violence or Detention, or any act of Depredation or Threat other than an act of Piracy, directed against a Ship or against Persons or Property onboard such Ships, within a States jurisdiction over such offences.

- **HIJACK**: Vessels taken by attacker, no longer under the control of the master.
- FIRED UPON/ATTACK: Use of weapon by assailants at vessel or boarding with intent to take control of the vessel.
- **BOARDING**: Unauthorized boarding of a vessel by persons not part of its complement without taken control of the vessel.
- **ROBBERY**: Theft realize in territorial waters with threat or violence to crew.
- **THEFT**: Theft realize in territorial waters with no violence.

• ILLEGAL UNREPORTED UNREGULATED FISHING.

Illegal fishing conducted by national or foreign vessels in contravention of laws and regulations. Fishing conducted by vessels flying the flag of States that are parties to a regional fisheries management organization but operate in contravention of the conservation and management measures. Fishing in violation of national laws or international obligations. Fishing activities which have not been reported, or have been misreported. Fishing in the area of application of a regional fisheries management organization that are conducted by vessels without nationality. Fishing in areas or for fish stocks in relation to which there are no applicable conservation or management measures.

• MARITIME MIGRATION.

STOWAWAY: A person who hides on a ship, aircraft, or other vehicle 2. Someone who hides on a ship or aircraft to travel without having to pay.

• ILLICIT TRADE.

ILLEGAL BUNKERING: Bunkering is a term used to describe the process of filling a ship with oil (or coal). Illegal oil bunkering is a euphemism for theft.

• OTHER MARITIME INCIDENCES.

SUSPICIOUS APPROACH: All other unexplained activity in close proximity of an unknown vessel.

SIGHTING AND IRREGULAR ACTIVITY: All suspicious information with no proof of intent to board the vessel.

DETAILS OF INCIDENT

KIDNAPPING - CALABAR, NIGERIA

A local passenger craft was reported to have been attacked at the Calabar river, Cross Rivers state, Nigeria at an unknown time on 17 January 2022.

According to the report, an unknown number of perpetrators attack the craft whiles enroute from Calabar to Oron. Both the craft and the passengers are missing, with the passengers suspected to have been kidnapped.

LOCATION OF INCIDENT




DETAILS OF INCIDENT

ARMED ROBBERY - BRASS RIVER, NIGERIA

A local fishing craft was reported to have been attacked near the mouth of Brass river, Nigeria at an unknown time on 19 January 2022.

According to local sources, a speedboat with an unknown number of armed men attack the fishing boat, stole the outboard engines. There was no reports of casualties or injuries.


GENERAL COMMENTS/ADVISORIES

- ➤ The week under review remained calm. However, two incidents were recorded within Nigerian internal waters against local passenger and fishing boats.
- An increased threat of piracy attacks against vessels were reported within the Ghanaian and Nigerian EEZs during the week. Although no offshore incident was recorded, the threat of piracy attacks still exists in the designated areas and beyond.
- This is the second week of 2022 without offshore piracy incident. Compared to same period 2021, four offshore incidents were recorded two Suspicious Approaches, Attempted Boarding, and Fired Upon incidents.
- All vessels transiting the GoG are advised to be extra vigilant, maintain sharp lookout especially at night and report any suspicious activities to the necessary authorities.
- Coastal law enforcement agencies and foreign navies operating in the region are encouraged not to relent in their surveillance and patrols within the GoG to deter and arrest pirate action groups.

FORCAST FOR THE COMING WEEK

- Maritime Zone F is expected to be relatively safe. However pirate attacks is likely especially within Ghana's eastern waters.
- ➤ Maritime Zone E and D are expected to be relatively safe. However pirate attacks is more likely.
- ➤ Maritime Zone A and G are expected to remain relatively safe. However petty theft and robberies within ports and anchorages are likely.
- Attacks against fishing vessels in the coming days are likely.


NOTICES

Oil Fields

• All vessels transiting close to the oilfields are to observe the promulgated maritime safety and security zones around the oil fields.

West African Gas Pipeline

- The West African Gas pipeline extends from Takoradi in Ghana to Nigeria. The pipeline since its installation has experienced periodic breakages due to fishing and anchoring activities on the pipeline.
- The position of the pipeline is shown on maritime charts.
- All vessels transiting the coastal areas between Ghana and Nigeria are to avoid anchoring and fishing within the pipeline protective zone.
